


## **MISSISSIPPI COUNCIL ON DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES**

**Membership applications to the Mississippi Council on Developmental Disabilities (MSCDD) are available now!** Are you ready to join a group of advocates focused on improving the lives of people with developmental disabilities? Are you a person with a developmental disability or family member? MSCDD is accepting applications to be considered for a Governor's appointment to the Council. At least 60% of the members are people with developmental disabilities or family members. Major responsibilities include participating in Council meetings, serving on one or more committees, and reviewing grant proposals. Council member travel expenses are reimbursed. ## **INSTITUTE FOR DISABILITY STUDIES**

**Mississippi Job Extravaganza . . . An Inclusive Business Learning Experience** Since November 2022, the Institute for Disability Studies has hosted three Job Extravaganza events in Long Beach, Pearl, and Bay St. Louis for over 180 secondary students with disabilities. Job Extravaganza is a fun-filled and educational experience with the primary purpose of providing an inclusive, hands-on business learning experience. The goal of Job Extravaganza is to provide an environment in which students can explore a variety of careers at their own pace which can help them identify what career options best fit their preferences, strengths, and interests.


Each Job Extravaganza event actually begins with a virtual pre-session for student attendees to review the in-person day agenda, discuss rules, student role, business experience opportunities and overall expectations. The in-person event consists of community-based businesses from the local areas that providing job skills stations. The students visit these stations, learn various employment-related tasks and receive valuable feedback. Examples of job tasks include using a cash register, washing a car, and making a trophy. Creativity is certainly appreciated and evident within the various job tasks. In addition to the students visiting all job stations, they receive lunch, have networking time, and receive direct pre-employment training. Within two weeks following the in-person event, students have one more Zoom meeting to review the event activities, discuss the businesses, skill opportunities and interests and plan for next learning steps. Job Extravaganza is a collaboration with the Mississippi Department of Rehabilitation Services. A new contract was received in spring 2024 to offer 4-6 of these events each year in south- and south-central Mississippi. #### **RISE To The Top! Accepts Fall 2024 Cohort**

RISE To The Top!, a collaboration between the Institute for Disability Studies and School of Interdisciplinary Studies and Professional Development, is the inclusive postsecondary education program for students with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities at Southern Miss. The program has selected and admitted students for the fall semester 2024, the first cohort since the program became officially IHL approved in 2023. RISE (Reaching, Including, Supporting, Educating) To The Top! is a fully approved, 4-year, 8-semester inclusive non-degree certificate program that incorporates academics and employment preparation. This new cohort joins current RISE students, two sophomores and one freshman, who were grandfathered from the pilot program are near the completion of the spring semester. The RISE program includes: (1) Inclusive classes and person-centered planning; (2) Independent living and professional development training and student partners (peer mentoring); (3) Preemployment training and internships; (4) Service and volunteer experiences; and (5) Campus and community involvement. Program specifics include application to Student Accessibility Services; individualized campus schedules; enrollment in a class(es) each semester; peer mentors; employment-focused internships; participation in campus life activities; service involvement; participation in a commencement ceremony and any other current student benefits at the University.
