In honor of **Black History Month**, celebrate the many African American advocates with disabilities who used their abilities to better society!



Harriet Tubman is a figure well known for her contributions to help free slaves. She suffered severe head injury by the hands of a slave master. Because of her injuries, Tubman struggled with lifelong epilepsy, narcolepsy and severe headaches. This did not stop her from leading hundreds of slaves to freedom through the Underground Railroad.



Claudia Gordan, from rural Jamaica, became deaf at age 8 because she did not have access to medial care. She was ridiculed, pulled out of school and lost her friends. At age 11, she moved to the United States and graduated from high school as a valedictorian. Gordon became the first African American woman to earn a law degree in disability-rights and

policy at American University's Washington College of Law. The Obama Administration appointed her as the Special Assistant to the Director of the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs in the Department of Labor.
